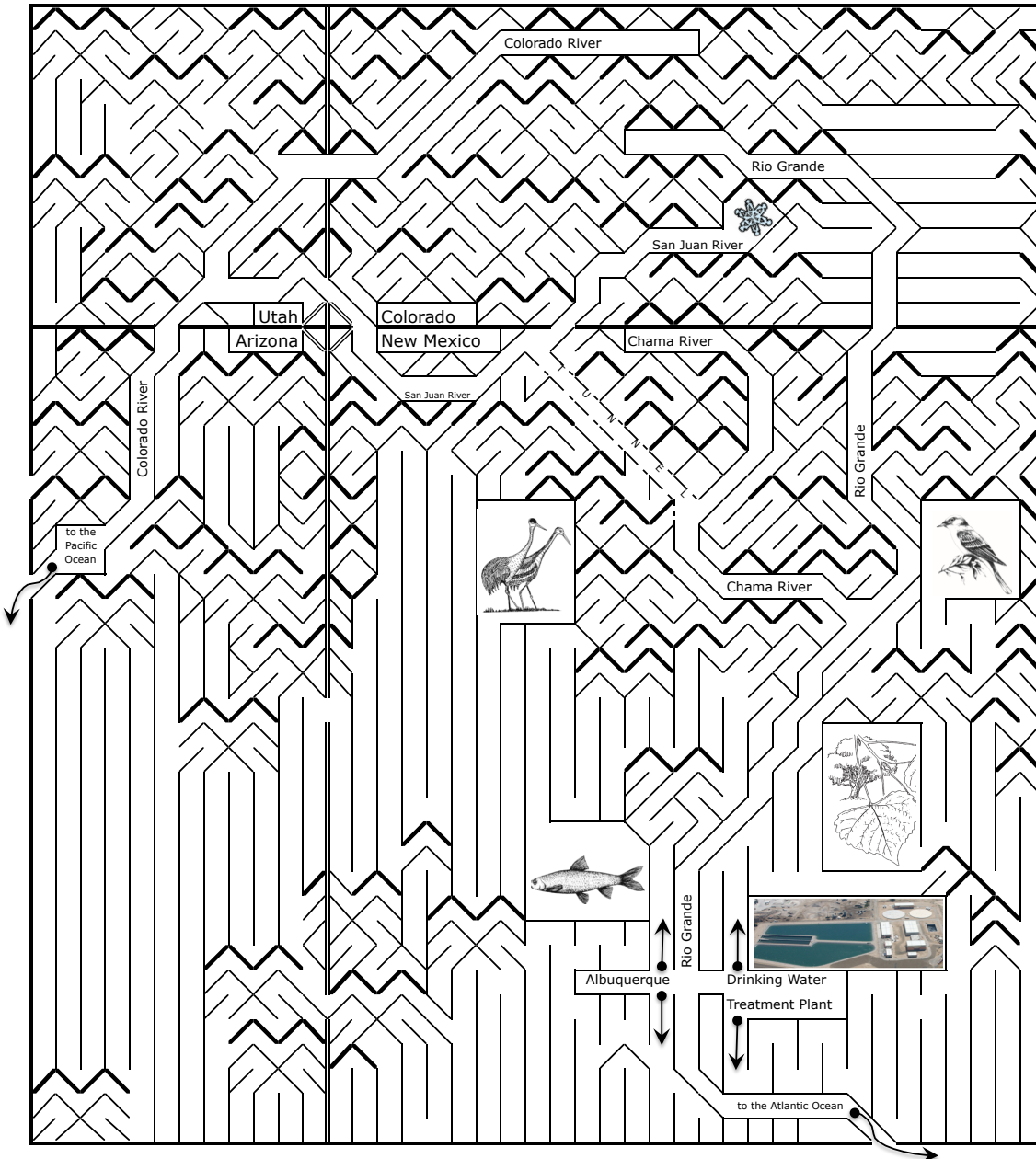


Water Ways Maze



1. Find and color YELLOW the names of the 4 states that meet at the same point, called the Four Corners. Also color YELLOW the Four Corners space and the state boundary lines.
2. Find Albuquerque and color it RED.
3. Start at the SNOWFLAKE in the mountains in Colorado and the San Juan River. Follow the path through the maze to Albuquerque and the Drinking Water Treatment Plant.
 - a. The water flows down the mountains in the San Juan River, then travels through the mountains in a _____.
 - b. From the tunnel, the water joins the _____ River.
 - c. The Chama River flows into the _____ River.

5. Follow the path of the Chama River.
The Chama River flows in the _____ River.
The Rio Grande River flows into the _____ Ocean.
Color GREEN the path of the Chama and Rio Grande Rivers.
6. Cottonwood Trees grow along the banks of the Rio Grande, creating homes for many animals.
Start at the DOWN arrow at the Drinking Water Treatment Plant to find the way to the Cottonwood Trees. Color this path PURPLE.
7. In the Fall, Sandhill Cranes migrate through New Mexico, stopping at the Rio Grande along the way.
Start at the DOWN arrow at Albuquerque to find the way to the Sandhill Cranes.
Color this path ORANGE.
8. The Silvery Minnow is a small fish, endangered that lives in the Rio Grande. It needs a healthy Rio Grande to survive.
Start at the UP arrow at Albuquerque to find the way to the Silver Minnow. Color this path GRAY.
9. The Southwest Willow Flycatcher is a small, endangered bird found in the bosque, or forest, surrounding the Rio Grande. It needs a healthy forest to survive.
Start at the UP arrow at the Drinking Water Treatment Plant to find the way to the Southwest Willow Flycatcher. Color this path PINK.

The rivers of the arid Southwest provide much needed water to plants, animals and people. The City of Albuquerque, and the plants and animals of the Bosque, rely on this water. We could not live here without it.

The next time you fill up a glass with water from your faucet, remember it came from the mountains of Colorado! It took a lot of work to get it to you. Every drop counts.
